RE: 2018 GPD Year End Report

This past year of 2018 has been a busy year for the Greenfield Police Department. I will try to outline below the accomplishments and projects that has been started, completed, and achieved within our department during the year of 2018. Some of these goals and projects have been achieved and completed, yet some are still in the implementation phase and will be completed during the year of 2019. These accomplishments consists of the following:

- 1) Held a promotion process where several new road supervisors were promoted to various positions.
- 2) Captain Hartman was appointed the new Road Division Captain after an interview process.
- 3) Added a full-time School Resource Officer into the Greenfield-Central CSC.
- 4) Completed the implementation of 12 hour road patrol shifts making manpower more efficient.
- 5) Completed a road division realignment where a 4th patrol squad was created to improve manpower efficiency.
- 6) Successfully graduated 6 officers from the IMPD Leadership Academy.
- 7) Organize and streamlined GPD social media presence.
- 8) Crime Analyst began developing mapping process to analyze statistical data such as crime, traffic, and safety concerns in order to effectively address these community issues through proactive and preventative enforcement strategies. (re: high-crime areas, high-crash intersections, etc.)
- 9) Added two additional highly trained K9 officers and handlers to GPD
- 10) Completed the implementation of a county-wide Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) and procedures.
- 11) Purchased new golf cart for public relations events and Pennsy Trail patrol to replace old golf cart.
- 12) Completed process of converting GPD historical photos to digital media database for preservation. Now attempting to categorize the database.

- 13) Began process of basement renovation project to improve efficiency in Investigations Division and evidence processing and is nearing completion.
- 14) Completed the implementation the Police One training website to be more efficient in conducting training in a cost-effective manner.
- 15) Completed the implementation of Aladtec online scheduling program to modernize scheduling functions.
- 16) Secured funding / donations for the purchase of 7 new AEDs so that all patrol officers now carry an AED in their patrol vehicle.
- 17) Secured a grant for the purchase of (4) new portable breath testers.
- 18) Secured a matching grant for the purchase of (30) ballistic vests.
- 19) Replaced all handheld radios with more modern Motorola handheld radios.
- 20) Held a computer simulated decision based firearms training (FATS).
- 21) Contacted countless children through DARE program culminating with a DARE graduation.
- 22) Planning phase of county-wide critical incident response protocol for large scale disasters and events ongoing.
- 23) Raised significant amount of money for Cops 4 Kids program and held a successful Cops 4 Kids event ensuring children receive clothes and gifts for Christmas.
- 24) GPD provided assistance to 24 different events / festivals in 2018.

GENERAL STATISTICS 2018

- GPD has responded to 26,889 calls for service in 2018 up from 23,167 in 2017.
- **16% increase in calls for service from 2017 to 2018**

- 700 total vehicle crashes
- 613 property damage vehicle crashes
- 87 personal injury crashes (with 127 total injuries reported)
- 1 fatality vehicle accident
- 3 vehicle crashes involving bicycles
- 3 vehicle crashes involving pedestrians
- **14% increase in vehicle crashes from 2017 to 2018**

Narcan Usage 2018

- 17 Narcan doses used during 7 overdoses
- Narcan used on 7 victims

Total 2018 cases investigated 757 down from 788 in 2017, including narcotics cases. Totals show 2018 investigations were down -4% from 2017, which had been up 9%. I believe that most of the decrease is from additional reports being assigned to patrol for follow up.

Goals for 2019

There are numerous goals that we would like to achieve in 2019 including the following:

- Re-establish bike team and purchase new police bikes to help with community interaction at public events.
- Re-establish Honor Guard after dwindling membership and outdated uniforms. We now have purchased new Honor Guard uniforms and are in the process of putting three more members on the team to become more active in honor guard activities.
- Complete the implementation phase of a county-wide Critical Incident Response Protocol for law enforcement, fire, EOC, EMA, and multiple other agencies to respond to disasters in a more efficient manner.
- Convene a SOP Committee to evaluate and study our current SOPs and recommend any changes that need to be made.
- Establish a Community Policing model and initiative to begin involving all members of our department to engage the public.
- Complete our pledge to become only the second “One Mind Campaign” police department in the state of Indiana. This pledge states that we will have all of our officers trained in mental health first aid and at least 20% of our officers trained in a 40-hour CIT course.
- We would like to make some range house improvements to make our range an even more inviting asset to other departments to host their trainings at.

These are some of our primary goals for GPD for the year of 2019. This year was full of supervisory changes at GPD and we feel that a solid foundation has been laid in 2018 to be forward-looking, therefore setting into motion several very important goals and initiatives to achieve in 2019 and the years to come that will benefit the City of Greenfield.
